Areas of Focus: Employment, Food Insecurity, Poverty

Communication

- Multiple Languages
- Internet Access for all via computer hubs
- Multiple Modes
- Go to where the people are (e.g. their employers) don't expect people to come to us

Transportation

- More and better public transportation
- Partnership w/large businesses
- Bike resources such as Nice Ride and better bike lanes

Bloomington City Resource Center

A physical space that:

- Is staffed by volunteers and professionals with cultural awareness/education - potentially high school students who need service hours
- Helps people connect and navigate resources that are online or in person
- Resource center will provide day care
- Staff are aware and motivated to help and provide the full services required

Examples of resources:

- Application Proofreading
- Practice Interviews
- Job Boards and help finding a job
- Financial Education
- Home Buying Resources
- Rent Assistance Programs

Small Business GROWTH

- Incentives or Tax Breaks for BIPOC owned businesses
- 98 + Lyndale Development Plan

- Create small downtown city with retail, restaurants, housing, businesses that attracts all ages, especially young people 20's-30's) in a central location
- Incentives or tax breaks for employers offering livable wages PTO and health benefits
 - O Tiered incentives to reward higher wages and better benefits

Big Dream

- Raise minimum wage /offer incentives for business that do
- Sick & Safe leave

EDUCATION

Guiding Principles: Equity, Accountability, Measurements & Data

Big Dreams

- House executive offices for the City and the school district in one location
- City- set minimum (liveable) wage
- Rezone school lines boundary

Communication

- Increase communication between School District leadership/staff and City of Bloomington leadership/staff
- Bring both racial equity plan from City and district into alignment so that they support each other
- Exchange data to increase awareness of equity gaps (inequities and disparities)
- Ensure all Bloomington languages are represented in all communication
- Have an open forum for new ideas

Supporting Students and families

- · More city bussing, especially for after-school
- Provide more jobs for students that will lead to opportunities for professional growth
- City center economic resource center for those that need it ---help create a hub
- Homeless shelter in Bloomington with resources for students.

Supporting School Staff

- Mentorship for teachers and administrators of color
- Fund and provide equity training for all School Staff
- City Council and School board meet regularly to discuss gaps and ways to support each other Incentives to hire teachers of Color and retain them
- More city bussing especially for after-school Supports
- Provide more jobs for students that and families lead to opportunities for professional growth
- Create a City Center or Economic Recourse center for those who need it (focus on developing a business resource hub)
- City puts parameters around achievement gap and opportunity gaps

NEIGHBORHOOD AND BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Housing Gaps

- Renter protections
- Home ownership among BIPOC residents
- Residents knowledge of rights and resources
- Deeply affordable housing (below 50% AMI)

Housing Prototypes

- Collaborations with banks mortgage providers, and realtors to direct first time buyers to resources, programs, education modules, etc.
- Pass a slate of strong renter protection ordinances Examples:
 - source of income nondiscrimination
 - tenant screening units (evictions, credit score, criminal history)
 - just cause nonrenewal
 - tenant opportunity to purchase
 - accessible housing ordinance for new developments
- Forgivable homebuyer loans for underrepresented communities (ex. living in city for "x" number of years)
- Adopt equitable development scorecard
- Work with Bloomington Education Advisory Council to develop programming for aspiring homeowners
 - Examples
 - Navigating the buying process
 - Home repair education
- Repeal crime-free housing ordinance

Food Access GAPS

- Food Access + deserts
- Access to medically necessary and/or Culturally specific foods
- food sovereignty

Food Access Prototypes

• City-supported cultural food programs for food pantries

- Grants for community gardens
- Lift city restrictions limiting gardens
- Mobile food banks
- More frequent fresh markets
- Partner with Public Health for medically-necessary food boxes/access/delivery
- Programming for home gardens + livestock

Environment GAPS

- equitable transportation
- biodiversity
- equitable access + inclusivity to natural resources
- multi-cultural communities (from cultural genocide/colonialism of Indigenous peoples)

Environment Prototypes

- Partner with rideshare companies to provide rides to meet various groups
- Partnership with three rivers on programming
- Incorporate parks master plan-and make accessible
- Build a universally-accessible playground + intergenerational equity
- Equity audit of city policies related to neighborhood and built environment
- conduct assessments mirroring Canadian schools' current investigations of their history in cultural genocide
- Community displays valuing/recognizing native lands and peoples (ex: city hall window display, community parade)
- Devote community spaces to values in DEI (ex: bench plaque, sculpture, library building, park)
